"An individual, group, or organization who may affect, be affected by, or perceive itself to be affected by a decision, activity, or outcome of a project." (PMI, 2013, p. 563)

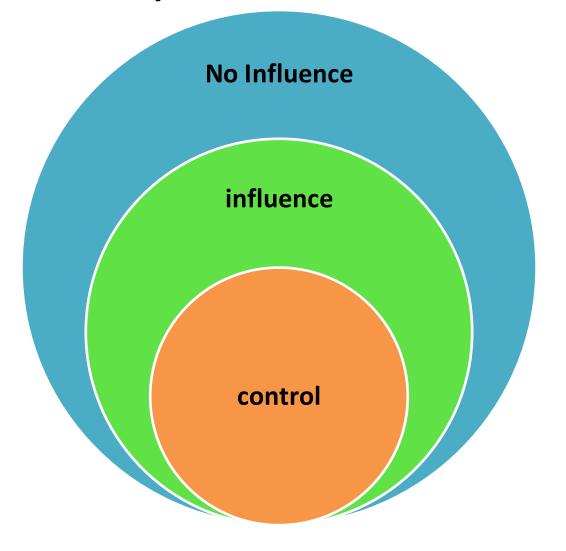

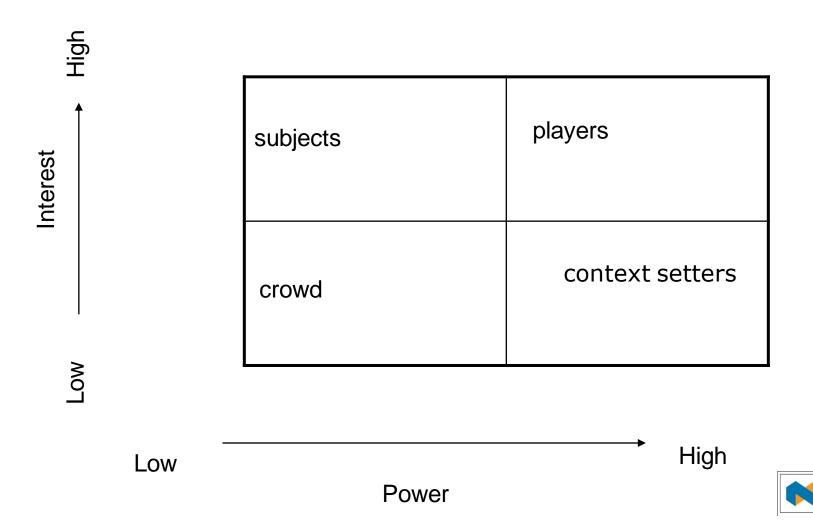
- Accesibility?

VIP stakeholders

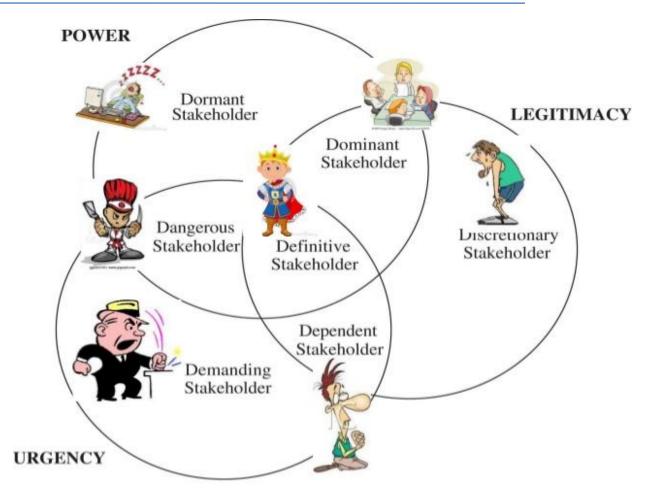


- Who is most important?

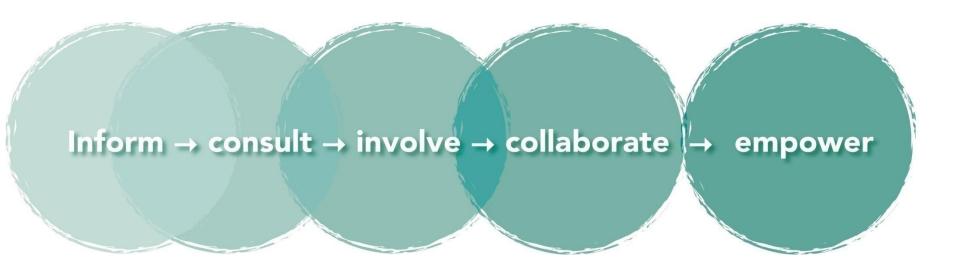

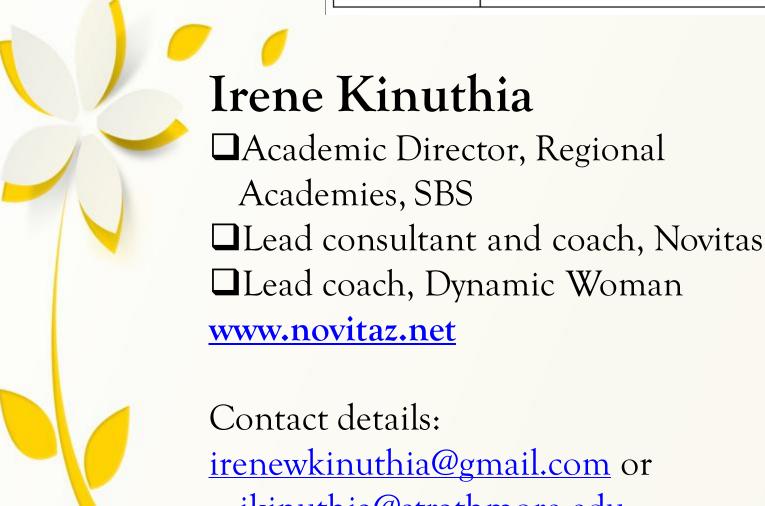












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
