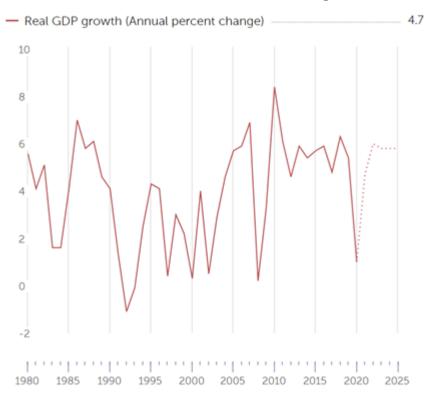
Regional Integration and Trade – Is Kenya's Competitive Edge Shrinking?

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# Kenya's competitive edge



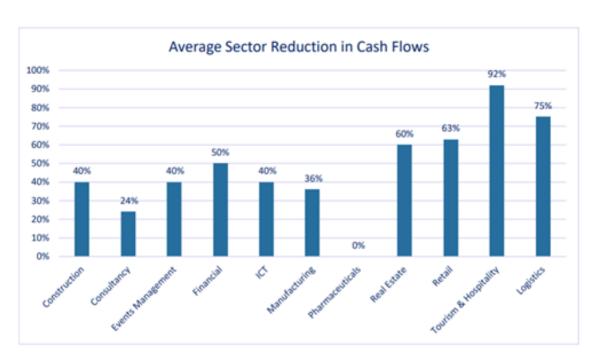
- ★ Major gateway to East Africa and a regional hub for trade, finance, communication, and transportation services
- ★ Mombasa Port serves **200 million** people as a critical node for import and export operations for the Northern Trade Corridor which also serves Northern Tanzania, Eastern DR Congo, South Sudan, and Southern Ethiopia.
- ★ Major **exporter** and **importer** of the East African Community (EAC) accounting for around **46%** of exports and **41%** of imports for the whole region.
- ★ Responsible for more than half of manufacturing value added produce in EAC



★ Real GDP at 1%, was at 5.4% in 2019

- ★ COVID-19 Pandemic induced an Economic Crisis:
- Economic disruptions

   emanating from the Health
   Crisis
- Spill-over effects from plummeting global economies
- Shocks from commodity prices and decline in tourism

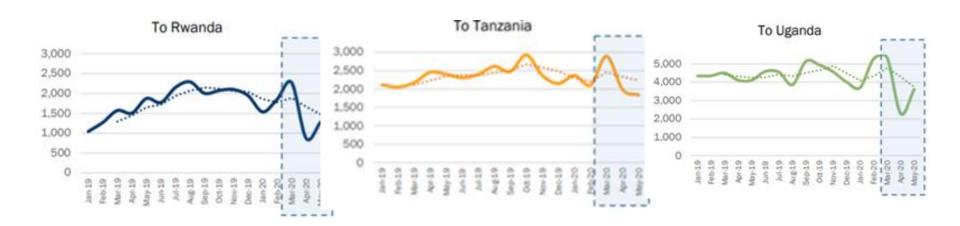


★ sectors adversely affected in the region are tourism, logistics, and retail

★ reduction in cash flow of about 92%, 75%, and 63% respectively

Kenya experienced a **fall** in exports to fellow EAC Member States- Uganda, Rwanda and Tanzania



Mold and Mveyange 2020

- **★ Decline** in Cross Border Trade
- ★ Increase in transit time (Malaba increased by 60% in April 2020 compared to April 2019)
- ★ Reduction in transit traffic at weighbridges on Northern Corridor reduced (from 2364 trucks in April 2019 to 821 trucks in April 2020)
- ★ Livelihood of communities at the borders who rely on cross border trade affected negatively



## Cog wheels of the economy: Challenges



- due to joblessness (aprox. 1.7 Mil Kenyans estimated to have lost jobs between April and June 2020 KNBS)
- apx 2Million Kenyans pushed into poverty (World Bank)
- decreased incomes (FSD K)2021

#### **★ Decline** in **production**:

- decline in commodity prices,
- high costs of production
- lack of inputs

#### **★ Stress** on the **financial sector**:

- decline in informal borrowing (FSD K 2021)
- digital borrowing rising with increased loan limits (FSD K 2021)



# 'Do not waste a crisis': Opportunities for resilience and recovery

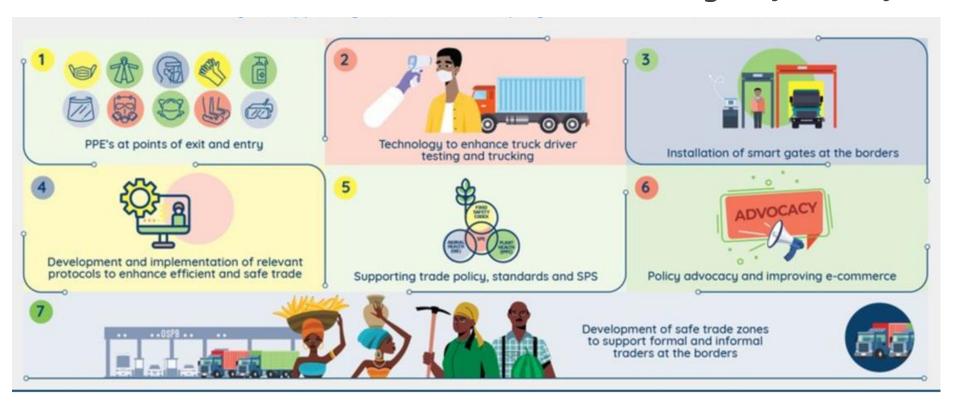
★ **Stimulus packages** by Government will spur growth ensuring sustained production and demand
